County Commissioner Chairman Mark Smith introduced the governor with a speech about the importance of any revenue from the severance tax being directed to the communities impacted by natural gas development. Commissioner Smith's full speech is available on the county website.

The courthouse rotunda was full as citizens and media all had a chance to listen to what the governor had to say. After the speech and the bill signing the governor visited and signed autographs for residents.

It was an exciting day around the courthouse during Governor Rendell's recent visit to Bradford County. The governor was in town to sign the Pennsylvania Fiscal Code which

included language that the legislature will work towards adopting a natural gas severance tax by October of this year. The governor pointed out that the reason he chose


and for all those who submitted footage of events that we couldn't tape due to time constraints. I look forward to seeing the finished product and will keep everyone informed when it is available for viewing online.

911 Readdressing Update

Addresses for Region 4 will be sent to residents between August 27 and September 3, 2010. The county has been fielding calls from each region that is finished. People are very inquisitive and are calling for answers to a variety of questions. The most popular question is, "Why are the numbers so far apart?" Our numbering system is the mile marker system and is used almost universally across the country, in one form or another. Our system

yields 1,000 addresses per mile, 500 on each side of the road. In other words, if a person's address is 2500 Main Street, we would know that they are 2.5 miles from the beginning of that road. All roads start in either the West or the South. Even numbers are on the right side of the road and odds are on the left. All of these details add up to a system that helps emergency responders get to call locations quicker. This is our ultimate goal.

Learn How to Read Your Water Test Results



Penn State Cooperative Extension will be holding a workshop, "How to Interpret Pre and Post Gas Drilling Water Test Reports" on Thursday, August 5, 2010 at the Towanda Gun Club, Rte 187 South, Towanda, PA. The meeting will start at 6:30 PM and end at approximately 8:30 PM. Participants will learn how to understand the complicated water pre and post test reports, as well as

drinking water standards, chain-of-custody, various water test parameters, and comparing test results with standards. Bryan Swistock, Penn State Water Resource Extension Associate and Mark Madden, Penn State Extension Agent will discuss the manage-

ment of private water supplies and interpretation of test reports.


Attendees will have a better understanding of the water testing and interpretation of results and how to treat pre-existing water quality problems.
